CAN WE DO MORE THAN: "LEAVE IT TO THEM"?

Our successful History Night just before Christmas, reminded me of how over the last 50 years, demographics and attitudes have changed, and they, plus the local topography, influence much of how we live. Today we have fuller lives, the pressure of working to support a household, the lure of "the screens", too little spare time, and electric gates and roller doors. We glide into our houses without having to really make contact with neighbours or our local area. The expectation of work, child-raising and grand-parenting, together with an inward-looking lifestyle often causes us to retreat and to detach ourselves from the community. Some create other barriers – resist further development in case it restricts our views, impacts upon our "amenity", or somehow dilutes the good life we have going for us. Have we lost our sense of community?

Marion Council, (... at long last) embarked on a **major tree planting program** in Marino. Advanced trees were planted and watered regularly. During the recent heat waves, many began to wilt. Rarely did I see local residents bother to pour a bucket of water on them. "They", I've been told, should water them more often ... "it's not my problem ... I pay my rates!"

Together we can do more? We make a better neighbourhood; we band together; we work up sensible strategies; pressure those in power and we don't simply leave it to "them". Some residents do get involved! They engage in beach cleanups, maintain the verge out front, and volunteer in the Conservation Park, the Community Garden, and the myriad of other groups trying to make this a better place. We have been successfully instrumental in some of these initiatives.

Your volunteer committee has held a workshop to explore possibilities. Further community consultation will occur. In the meantime it is business as usual.

We have had a serious plumbing problem, again, the second in 10 months. David Speirs MP has interceded on our behalf and a lot of clearing of the sewers has occurred. On a good news front we have been given a Council grant to put in a defibrillator and a federal Government grant of \$10,000 to purchase various critical items. Thank you to Marion Council and Nicole Flint MP. We are also in the process of putting up an outside notice board.

Marion Council Tim Gard

May I firstly welcome Seacliff residents to our news updates and trust you may all benefit from the unfolding plans of the City of Marion. 2019 has certainly begun at a cracking pace. Just this month a motion I put to Council was seconded by Ian Crossland, and resolution made, to lock any future international standard BMX track into the Majors Road site. There are a few hoops yet to be negotiated but this decision has the potential to breathe new and vibrant life into our environs.

The Marino Community Hall is also high on the City's review agenda and various future options are being explored. Likewise, tangible developments are imminent at the Boral mine, where tenders are being completed to redirect the mine's haulage road up to Majors Road. A big 'hooray' will result as Boral trucking will generally be diverted away from Brighton Road. This also opens up the way to advance the planning for the infamous and ugly Seacliff Park development site.

As for the bigger picture, my work to take the upward pressure off our rates is continuing through the Council's finance wing and the Valuer General. There's still a long way to go before equity and fairness prevails across our City from north to south.

As a new Councillor for HFB Seacliff Ward; I have enjoyed being involved with so many fantastic community events and meeting so many in the community, in such a short time. Thank you to everyone who voted for me!

Kingston Park Foreshore Master plan was endorsed in October 2015; construction has been completed on Stages 1 & 2- the coastal path. Council passed a recent motion to review the master plan before any further work. Up for review is the playground & tennis courts; car park; kiosk including deck seating area and cultural interpretation elements. Recently the council ran a workshop for Council with Kaurna Elders explaining cultural history of the Kingston Park Foreshore, burial grounds, Tjilbruke springs and dreamtime significance. The new plan seeks to focus on this.

Car park issues at Brighton Tourist Park at Kingston Park are being monitored. I will push for car spaces to be clearly marked, time restrictions; an extra "disabled" park, and completion of fence and restricting car access to the culturally sensitive areas. Council are "assessing" a raised flat-topped pedestrian crossing (as per "Brighton Surflifesaving Club") at Angus Neil Reserve. This will provide safe access between the popular park and beach; and a traffic calming effect on the Esplanade. Council is also considering a fence along the top of the hill behind the playground to prevent children climbing up the hill and running onto Marine Parade. "Caution children" signs will be going up on Marine Parade to help with driver awareness. Text me if you agree?
